1. Tinshu selected for GSBI 2006 in USA



Monday 31st of July 2006

The Executive Director of Helps International (HINT), Tinshu Genesis was 1 of 17 World-class Social Entrepreneurs selected by Santa Clara University's Centre for Science, Technology and Society (CSTS) for the 2006 Global Social Benefit Incubator (GSBI) program in partnership with Leavey School of Business, July 29-September 30, 2006 at Santa Clara University, USA.

Held on the beautiful campus of Santa Clara University, the GSBI provides an intensive two-week residential program at

Santa Clara University that enables successful technology innovators to scale their endeavors and achieve sustainability. Presented by the University's Center for Science, Technology, and Society and the Leavey School of Business Administration, the GSBI offers the unique context of a Jesuit university dedicated to social justice combined with leading resources of Silicon Valley. The invited social benefit entrepreneurs have demonstrated their commitment to applying technology to address urgent human needs throughout the world and have achieved recognition through the rigorous selection process of the prestigious Tech Museum's Awards: Technology Benefiting Humanity, the World Bank's Development Marketplace, the City of Rome's Global Junior Challenge competitions, or as Schwab Fellows..

3. Tinshu raises funds in USA for HINT

He bought a few to give to some friends and an idea came to buy a good quantity to use for fundraising. He then bought all of the man's cards. What a joyous day it must have been for this young guy. Previously, Tinshu had also bought some crafts from the "Marche de Fleur" in Douala for the same purpose.

Amazingly, during his one-month stay in the USA, Tinshu raised over US\$ 500 from the articles he sold during his time

in the USA, plus a donation of US\$ 2,500 from Anthony Bettencourt (one of his GSBI Mentors), plus more than US\$ 3,000 in cash and in kind donated by Pastor Stuart Nice and His Church, Valley Life Centre, giving a total of about US\$ 6,000.

5. The Joseph and Heather Talbot prize instituted

Back Packs is a program organised by HINT once a year at the beginning of each school year to provide school supplies to needy children. In 2006, about 30 children were helped.

During Back Packs 2006, we instituted the Joseph and Heather Talbot Prize for Service to Humanity in honour of the Joseph and Heather Talbot, volunteers from London working for HINT who were present during the award ceremony. The prize was instituted to appreciate and

promote their heart of sacrifice and voluntarism in Community projects.

The prize will be awarded each to a child in our community who has been noted by many to have a heart of a volunteer; one who is ready to serve and not look for a reward from men.

The 2006 prize was awarded to John Onofio of Government Primary School at Bonduma. John made sure that there was always clean drinking water at the HINT office. Each day, he would stop by at the office to collect bottles to fill with clean fresh water.

The prize has a monetary value of CFA 200,000 (US\$ 400, GBP 200) attached to it. The money will be used to cater for a child's entire education for the whole year including books, uniform, school fees, and health care.

8. HINT dedicates its first ever Health Advice & Counseling Centre




Helps International (HINT) has dedicated it first ever Health Advise and Counselling Centre in Buea, Cameroon. Witnessed by over 80 people, the occasion brought together community leaders including the chief of Wotolo Village where the Project is actually based.

Heather Talbot, a volunteer from England has been at the forefront of this project since arriving Cameroon in July 2006. Our initial goal was to set up a full Health Centre to serve about three villages but we were faced with government's very tough condition (a piece of land of our

own and a building plan signed by a registered architect). These are very tough conditions and require several tens of millions of FCFA which we cannot afford at the moment. So, we decided to focus for now on health advise and counseling with a strong emphasis on HIV/AIDS prevention.

9. Fundraising in UK for HINT



Saturday 23rd of December 2006

Two of HINT's UK supporters, Michael and Margaret Astbury who recently visited HINT Cameroon have organized a Coffee evening to raise funds for our Community Library Project here in Buea. About 80% of children in primary schools in Cameroon have 20% of the required text books while only about 20% have about 70% of the required text books. With this condition, learning for the children and teaching for the teachers become difficult. We have been trying to help this

situation by buying books for about 50 children for the past 2 years.

Based on a research conducted by Heather Talbot (currently volunteering for HINT) we have decided to set up a library to help provide textbooks to school children in Cameroon. We will buy and stock a large database of the books the children need and give out the books to them at the beginning of each school year. They will use and return to the library for other children to use and the cycle goes on and on.

Each child needs approximately 8-10 textbooks and each costs averagely US\$ 7 (GBP 3.6). The project will be formally launched in September 2007 when schools re-open in Cameroon.

About US \$ 578.8 (GBP 308) has now been raised so far for this project. However, we need US \$ 13,875.53 (GBP 7,191.63) to be able to set up a library with 2000 books to serve about 300 children in the 3 pilot schools we are working with. This is a very exciting and innovative program and we are inviting you to invest in a child's life today. The fulfillment of this project means that parents can save more money for childrens' health, nutrition, etc...

He conducted the first training session from October 30 to December 17, 2006 with 7 students in class. The students received a thorough foundation on HTML and CSS. With the knowledge, the students can then be able to design and maintain websites and this creates employment opportunities.

1. Who We Are

Helps International (HINT) is a community-based non-profit NGO that was founded to help improve on the social and economic well-being and health of the poor through education, skills development, and job creation without discrimination of race, color, religion, political beliefs, gender, national origin, or disability.

2. Our Objectives

- To fight poverty and unemployment by providing marketable skills in ICTs, agriculture, and business set-up & management.
- To provide interest-free loans to jobless and poor youths for business start-ups, thereby reducing unemployment.
- To improve on the health condition of the poor by setting up Health Centres in poor communities.
- To contribute to the fight against the rampant transmission of HIV/AIDS and other STIs
 through education and development of self-reliant projects for jobless adults, and vulnerable
 youths.
- To provide education, health care, clothing, and feeding assistance to orphans, street children and very poor children from subsistence farming homes.
- To contribute to community development through projects such as wells, portable water, health units, schools, Electricity...
- To offer emergency relief to victims of natural and/or man-made disasters when need arises.
- To HELP anyone in need whenever we have the resources to.

3. How we are organised

HINT Cameroon is led by an Executive Council comprising an **Executive Director** who works in close collaboration with an **Administrative Assistant**, **General Secretary**, a **Treasurer**, **Financial Secretary**, and **Communication Manager**. A **Board of Directors** provides overall guidance.

4. Our Projects/Strategies

- i. Information & Communication Technologies (ICTs)
 - Community ICT Training Centres
 Provide access to and job-oriented training in Computers, Internet, secretarial
 administration, web design, Networking, Computer Maintenance, Desktop Publishing,
 Photo Editing.
 - 2. Computers for Development (ComDev)
 Provision and installation of Computers in Schools, Community Centres, Non-profits ...

ii. Education

- 1. Child sponsorship
 - Providing, textbooks, fees, and uniforms to orphans and children from poor families.
- Community Education Libraries
 Ensuring that children in primary and secondary schools have the textbooks they need to be successful in their studies.
- 3. Community Education Centres
 Providing orphans and children from poor homes the opportunity to still have a dissent education despite their poor backgrounds.

iii. Health

1. Community Health Centres

Making it possible for the local community to have access to low-cost and affordable health care services.

2. HIV/AIDS

Sensitisation/awareness, Training Community Educators, Prevention, Counseling, support for PLWHA.

1. Micro-finance

Providing interest-free loans to young enterprising youths for business start-ups.

RISET will provide a two-year intensive entrepreneurial training to youths between the ages of 17-30 who have a passion to transform communities through Social Entrepreneurship. In the meantime, we run short seminars for young business people.

- 2. Providing electricity in underprivileged communities through Solar Energy.
- 3. Emergency Relief.

5. Achievements

- More than 600 youths have been trained since 2003 to be able to effectively use the computer and the internet.
- We currently run 2 IT training centres located in Buea, Cameroon equipped with over 30 computers.
- More than 50 children have been helped to attend school.
- More than 25 unemployed youths have been trained as web designers. With their new skills, they can generate income that will help them overcome poverty in their lives.
- About 12 people have so far received loans for micro-businesses.
- More than 60 community leaders have been trained to become HIV/AIDS Educators within their communities.
- HINT is a certified training partner with Kabissa's "Time to Get Online" Training program. Kabissa is a Washington-based NGO.
- HINT won the Global Junior Challenge competition in 2004 in Rome.
- HINT' was a participant at Africa Source II, which ran from Jan. 8-15, 2006, in Uganda, organized by Tactical Technology, Netherlands.
- HINT's Director is a graduate of the 2006 class of the Global Social Benefit Incubator (GSBI) program at Santa Clara University, USA.
- HINT has been congratulated by Cameroon's Minister of External Relations with a letter dated Jan. 24, 2005 and referenced 000219/DIPL/D3/SDCNG/ONG
